# **Budget Hearing and Budget Vote**

Please join us on Thursday, May 5th at 6:00 pm for the annual Budget Hearing. The budget hearing will take place in person, in the auditorium.

By now you should have received the mailing of the summary of the 2022-2023 budget. This year, in person voting will take place on Tuesday, May 17th from 1:00 pm - 8:00 pm in the **Auditorium Entryway**. In addition to voting on the budget, community members will also vote on the purchase of a small school bus. This purchase will be made from the bus reserve fund which was voted on and approved last year. The cost of the small bus will not have an impact on school taxes. Given the age of the small bus (2012) coupled with wear and tear, it is time for a replacement in order to ensure the safety of students and drivers.

# Growing the Future of NCS' Elementary School

Teachers and staff members in grades Kindergarten through second grade had an opportunity to witness experiential learning at the Little Wings Farm School in Greenfield, NY and the Waldorf School in Saratoga. Lessons without walls in the natural environment was one key component of the programming that was observed. A message from The Director Curriculum & Instruction, PJ Motsiff

Our 5th and 6th graders in Mr. Keglovits' class just finished a persuasive writing piece as part of their Writer's Workshop. Along with doing research on a topic of their choice, Mr. K also encouraged them to conduct interviews with staff and high school students. Each one of these students concluded in their opinion that students should be allowed to have access to their phones at school.

A number of the students interviewed me and asked if I think students should have cellphones in school. What a great topic for me to contemplate as an administrator. I explained to each student that New York State has a law against texting while driving. They even created "text stops" along major highways because of the increase each year in the number of fatalities due to distracted driving. I recognize being in school with a phone is not exactly the same as being behind the "wheel". However, everyday I see students distracted by the vibration of their devices.

I shared with the elementary student researchers authentic data from the student violation reports that have come to me since the start of January from our NCS teachers. The students were very surprised to see that cellphones were by far the ultimate school distraction of our high school students. Speaking to my colleagues in other schools, Newcomb is not any different than any other district in our area. We all know there are many benefits of having phones with us throughout the day. Most parents however don't realize what a problem cellphones can also cause at school. Policing cell phones is one of the biggest challenges we have here at NCS as you can see by the graph at the end of this article.

Did you know children under the age of 13 are not allowed to have a social media account? This is according to a US law through The Children's Online Privacy Protection Act (COPPA).

#### The following situations are ways cellphones can be a detriment to student learning.

Class Disruption - Students are distracted. When they are unfocused they have a harder time learning. Students are on websites for an average of 17 seconds. Looking up something educationally leads to a text, snap (picture), email or other social media check-in. There has been an increase in students saying "no" when a teacher asks for a phone, setting up a power struggle. The addiction is real and teachers can see students looking down under their desks at their devices. Bathroom Breaks have increased dramatically in order to check their phones. The ability to meet peers from other classes in the bathrooms now is happening. When phones are taken from students, some parents are getting upset with the teachers and school.

**Bullying** - In a recent program with a NYS Police officer here at NCS, he had students check their daily social media time - one of our NCS students reported over 12 hours! It is not all positive when kids are communicating on apps with one another. Even if a negative exchange takes place at home behind a screen, it always shows up in real life at school when students come into the building. We recognize all students have the right to a safe space to learn in but investigating these incidents takes time and makes it difficult when students are in the same classes together.


**Inappropriate Photos** - In consultation with our school support from Essex County, a large percentage of students have sent or received personal photos of their bodies. These pictures are then collected and shared out by others. The issue happens when minors start sharing with minors. This can be a misdemeanor or felony if caught.

**Mental Health** - When a student posts anything on social media about harming themselves or others and it is brought to our attention at school we have to take each one of these situations seriously and do an investigation.

Compromising Cyber Security - If students are not using school owned devices it makes it very hard to track what information students are viewing on their cellphones. We want to keep our students safe at school and when they have access to unlimited and sometimes inappropriate websites and pictures it can be difficult to ensure that everyone has a safe environment to be educated in.

The Newcomb Central School policy on cellphones states that students are allowed to use them only for academic purposes when teachers have granted permission.

Our students are living in an ever changing technological world and we appreciate all the support parents can give their teachers to help them navigate the safe and appropriate use of cellphones.



#### LEGAL NOTICE

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that the Budget Hearing of the inhabitants of the Newcomb Central School District, Newcomb New York, qualified to vote at school meetings in said district, will be held at the schoolhouse in said district on Thursday, May 5, 2022, at 6:00 p.m. for the transaction of such business as is authorized by the Education Law.

NOTICE IS ALSO GIVEN that a copy of the statement of the amount of money which will be required for the ensuing year for school purposes, exclusive of public monies, may be obtained by any taxpayer in the district during the seven days immediately preceding the Budget Hearing, except Saturday, Sunday, or holidays at the school during reasonable hours. A report of tax exemptions, showing how much of the total assessed value on the final assessment roll or rolls used in that budgetary process is exempt from taxation, shall be annexed to the budget document.

NOTICE IS ALSO GIVEN that petitions nominating candidates to fill the expired term of Lori DeMars for a five (5) year office as member of the Board of Education must be filed with the clerk of the district no later than April 18, 2022. Each petition must be directed to the clerk of the district, must be signed by at least twenty-five qualified voters of the district, must state the residence of each signer and must state the name and residence of the candidate.

NOTICE IS ALSO GIVEN that voting on the proposed budget for the 2022-2023 school year and for member of the Board of Education will take place on May 17, 2022 from 1:00 p.m. – 8:00 p.m. at the Newcomb Central School.

NOTICE IS ALSO GIVEN that the following proposition will appear on the ballot:

PROPOSITION NO. 1

Shall the following resolution be approved?

**RESOLVED**: that the Board of Education of the Newcomb Central School District be authorized to expend monies from the Bus Purchase Reserve Fund, previously established and approved by the voter of the District and currently maintaining a balance of \$340,020 to (a) acquire one (1) 30 passenger school bus at a cost not to exceed \$65,000, (b) expend such sum for said purchase; and (c) expend from the Bus Purchase Reserve Fund an amount not to exceed \$65,000 for such purpose.

Absentee ballots are available for qualified voters, who on the day of the Election/Budget vote, will be absent from the Newcomb Central School District because of duties, occupation, business, illness, physical disability, studies or vacation.

Application for an absentee ballot must be received by the district clerk or designee at least seven days before the election/budget vote if the ballot is to be mailed to the voter.

A list of persons to whom absentee ballots have been issued will be available for inspection in the district office during each of the five days prior to the day of the election except Saturday, Sunday, or holidays, and this list also will be posted at the polling place on the day of the election/budget vote.

An absentee ballot must reach the office of the district clerk/designee not later than 3:00 p.m. on the day of the election.

- A. Citizen of the United States
- B. 18 years of age or older
- C. Resident of the district for 30 days or more prior to the vote



# Seniors:

- 1. All seniors going off to college will need to fill out the <u>FAFSA</u>. You can apply online, which saves a lot of time. Before you can do that <u>you and a parent</u> need to register for a FSA ID. To get your FSA ID you can go to fsaid.ed.gov.
- 2. Make sure you have a copy of everything for your own records, <u>BEFORE</u> you mail it out. Be sure to check <u>your college</u> deadlines for financial aid forms! YOU NEED TO APPLY FOR FINANCIAL AID EVERY YEAR!
- **3.** If you have not applied for financial aid yet, you need to do so ASAP. You may apply online, but need a PIN number for you and a parent. Please go to <a href="www.fsaid.ed.gov">www.fsaid.ed.gov</a> to sign up for a PIN number. When you receive your PIN number go to <a href="www.fafsa.ed.gov">www.fafsa.ed.gov</a> to apply for Financial Aid. It is getting late, the money will be gone, please do this now if you haven't already done so.

- **4.** Parents of Seniors: Please keep an eye out in the mail for scholarship opportunities. I usually send them out in the winter/spring. I send all scholarship opportunities home to each senior's family. You will need to read the qualifications to see if your child/family qualifies for the scholarships, before your child applies.
- **5.** If you are applying to Private Colleges, check to see if they require the CSS Profile. This is another financial document that they often require. Check for deadline dates as well. This is a 19 page document, with a LARGE number of financial questions. Please do not wait until the night it is due to begin this profile.

#### SELECTIVE SERVICE/ DRAFT REGISTRATION

All male citizens of the United States are required to register with the Selective Service within 30 days of their 18th birthday. Registration forms are available at the post office or at www.sss.gov. Federal financial aid programs for college will be withheld from students who fail to comply.

# **Time Line in the College Application Process**

# **SPRING 11<sup>th</sup> GRADE**

- Attend Spring College Night at SUNY Adirondack. You can make contact with a lot of colleges in a short amount of time.
- Register for and take the Spring SAT and/or ACT's.
- Visit potential colleges of interest.

# **Timeline in the College Application Process**

#### FALL 12<sup>TH</sup> GRADE

- Gather your list of activities and community involvement. Write a resume.
- Continue visiting and narrowing your possible college choices.
- Contact teachers for letters of recommendation.
- If applying Early Decision be aware of deadlines, Nov. 1<sup>st</sup> is common (There are also special Early Decision Financial Aid Forms).
- Almost all applications can now be done online. If you choose to do this, notify the guidance
  office so all supporting documentation can be forwarded.
- Many applications have a secondary school report required. Bring these forms to the guidance
  office immediately for completion or invite your teachers and counselor electronically.
- Set a goal of December 1<sup>st</sup> to have all applications complete. Do not plan to have an application processed over Christmas Vacation.
- October is Financial Aid month. Start by applying for a Signature PIN number at <a href="http://www.fsaid.ed.gov/">http://www.fsaid.ed.gov/</a>. All aid packages start with the FAFSA form which must be done online at <a href="http://www.fafsa.ed.gov/">http://www.fafsa.ed.gov/</a>. Some colleges have additional forms, institutional or CSS profiles. Be sure to make yourself aware of what you need.
- Each college has its own Financial Aid deadline. Students are responsible for this information. Always make the financial aid deadline, even if you have to estimate earnings.
- There will be Financial Aid Seminars in the area. These dates will be advertised in the school newsletter.

# PLEASE BE MINDFUL WHEN SENDING FOOD TO SCHOOL WITH YOUR STUDENT



The following NCS policies are in effect:

- All students will NOT be allowed to eat peanuts/nuts (or items containing them) in any school environment or vehicle.
- Homemade baked goods/foods will NOT be allowed in school.
- Please read the food labels on packaged items your own child may bring to school to ensure no peanuts, tree nuts, peanut butter or peanut oil is among the ingredients.
- While reading food labels, please be mindful of any statements that indicate that
  the food item was produced or processed in a building/on equipment where
  peanuts or tree nuts are also produced/processed, or statements such as "item may
  contain trace nuts." Labels stating this will NOT be allowed in school.
- If the package does not clearly state "packaged in a facility WITHOUT nuts" the ingredients must be labeled and read to guarantee no nuts/nut products are contained.

While many allergic reactions can be mild, most children with peanut and other nut allergies experience serious symptoms after eating, touching or smelling peanuts or any nut products (especially peanut butter). Please take time to read the labels on any food that you purchase for your child to bring to school.

# Fight Flu

# at Home and School

Flu, or influenza, spreads easily and can make people very sick, especially kids. You can help stop flu!

#### Flu symptoms include:

Fever or chills, body aches, cough, sore throat, headache, runny or stuffy nose, feeling very tired. Some people, especially children, may have stomach problems and diarrhea. Unlike a cold, the flu comes on very suddenly.

#### Prevent flu!

- Flu vaccine is the best protection against the flu. It is recommended every year for everyone 6 months and older.
- Get the flu vaccine for you and your children every year! It helps make flu sickness milder or prevents it all together.
- Getting the vaccine early in the fall means you and your children will be protected when flu season starts.
- Ask people close to your children, like babysitters and relatives, to get the vaccine, too.
- The vaccine is especially important for people with certain health conditions, like asthma, diabetes, heart or lung conditions because the flu can make them even sicker.

#### If your child gets the flu:

- · Your child will need plenty of rest and lots of fluids.
- Keep your child home from school for at least 24 hours after their fever is gone without using fever-control medicine. This helps avoid giving the flu to others.
- Talk with your child's health care provider before giving a child any overthe-counter medicine.
- Never give your child or teenager aspirin or any medicine that has aspirin in it. Aspirin can cause serious problems.
- If your child gets flu symptoms and is younger than 5 or has a medical
  condition like asthma, diabetes, or heart or lung disease, call their health
  care provider. Young children and those with certain medical conditions
  are at greater risk for getting seriously ill from the flu. Ask their health care
  provider if they recommend an antiviral drug.
- If you are worried about your child, call their health care provider.

#### Don't spread flu!

- · Wash hands often with soap and water for at least 20 seconds.
- If soap and water aren't handy, use an alcohol-based hand rub.
- Cough or sneeze into a tissue or your elbow, not your hands. Put used tissues in the trash.
- Avoid touching your eyes, nose, and mouth. That's how germs spread.
- · Stay away from people who are sick.
