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Inter-School Collaborations
"On your mark, get set.......GO!" A message from Superintendent Chris Fisher

Forging instructional partnerships with schools in the True North has been one focus for NCS this year. This past month, NCS once again welcomed students in kindergarten and first grade from Minerva Central School District to join us for a combined lunch, physical education activity and a STEAM activity. In March, Minerva will return the favor by welcoming NCS students in prekindergarten through second grade to participate in Dr. Seuss Day with a combined lunch, a physical education activity and classroom connections to celebrate Dr. Seuss. Students aren't the only beneficiaries of inter-school collaborations. This year, the True North Consortium, comprised of eight north country school districts have set up a plan for ongoing professional collaborations amongst content area teachers. Given that small schools often are a department of one, having colleagues in other schools to share curricular materials, ask questions and exchange best practices is essential.

NCS is supportive of inter-school visitations and observations for new teachers as well as seasoned teachers. This past fall, teachers connected with colleagues in Indian Lake Central School District, Minerva Central School District, and Warrensburg Central School District.

Although all True North schools have similarities, interacting with and learning from one another is powerful in our quest for ongoing school improvement. Pooling our resources together for experiences like sports, transportation, CASMA, the prom, and professional development enable small schools to increase opportunities for both students and staff.

I am appreciative of the autonomy that our north country communities have for our individual schools. Each school has their own identity, uniqueness, and a climate and culture that feels like home. I am also grateful for the partnerships of our surrounding school communities and the working partnerships that we have with each of them for the betterment of all children.

## Empowering Our Young Leaders

Our annual TRIP (Thesis Research Investigative Project) for all of our high school students was completed in January. This is an opportunity for each student to present their cross-curricular project to the entire school community. The effects of this project have taken roots in many student led initiatives this past month here at NCS. I have been privileged to witness the leadership qualities of all of our students as they continue to make Newcomb proud.

Mr. Phelps, Mrs. Primo, and Mrs. Markwica brought a number of students in grades 7-12 to Silver Bay for a Youth in Government meeting with approximately 80 students from other area schools. It was a final tune-up before our students travel to Albany this month to present their bills at the New York State Conference.


One to two times each month a small group of "teenfluencers" get together to discuss the science of happiness and how we can empower others in our school to have a more positive experience. This group is working on a number of initiatives but most recently went through self-awareness training with a social emotional specialist from Glens Falls and a professor from Adelphi University. After the training they shared their personal stories and had an interactive discussion with the fifth and sixth graders about what their aspirations are.


The University of Rochester invited our eighth grade students to participate in a day long Above the Influence program at the Essex County Community Center. We were joined by students from Ticonderoga and Bouquet Valley. Above the Influence teaches eighth graders to create a school culture in which more students can overcome peer pressure. After going through the training, students are able to identify what motivates them to rise above negative influences and how peer norms drive behavior. They also learned about the powerful role they have in shifting attitudes toward others in our school. The students will continue to work with peer leaders to facilitate prevention campaigns throughout the year.

Our fifth and sixth graders honored Mrs. Fisher and other staff for National Random Act of Kindness Day. Ellie and Sue, our kitchen staff, came up with an idea to have our students learn about a proper table setting and how a formal meal might differ from one in the cafeteria. The students created a menu that included chicken parmesan, baked potato, salad, fresh baked rolls, and cheesecake. It was a pleasure to see our oldest elementary students honor some of the adults that work with them on a daily basis.

Lauren Hai, Emily Fifield, Marcus Armstrong, and Logan Bush launched a student facilitated social media account with both Instagram and Facebook. The final blessing was granted from the school Board of Education after a presentation by the students.

## SENIORS

1. All seniors going off to college will need to fill out the $\boldsymbol{F A F S A}$ (www.fafsa.ed.gov) which began in October this year. You can apply online, which can save a lot of time. Before you can do that, you and a parent need to register for a $\boldsymbol{F S} \boldsymbol{A}$ ID. To get your $\boldsymbol{F S} \boldsymbol{A}$ ID you can go to fsaid.ed.gov.
2. Make sure you have a copy of everything for your own records, BEFORE you mail it out. Be sure to check your college deadlines for financial aid forms! YOU NEED TO APPLY FOR FINANCIAL AID EVERY YEAR!
3. If you have not done so already, you need to get your college applications ready to send out. The sooner the better!
4. Parents of seniors: please keep an eye out in the mail for scholarship opportunities. I usually send them out in the winter/spring. I send all scholarship opportunities home to each senior's family. You will need to read the qualifications to see if your child/family qualifies for the scholarships, before your child applies.

# PLEASE BE MINDFUL WHEN SENDING FOOD TO SCHOOL WITH YOUR STUDENT 



The following NCS policies remain in effect:

- All students will NOT be allowed to eat peanuts/nuts (or items containing them) in any school environment or vehicle.


## - Homemade baked goods/foods will NOT be allowed in school.

- Please read the food labels on packaged items your own child may bring to school to ensure no peanuts, tree nuts, peanut butter or peanut oil is among the ingredients.
- While reading food labels, please be mindful of any statements that indicate that the food item was produced or processed in a building/on equipment where peanuts or tree nuts are also produced/processed, or statements such as "item may contain trace nuts." Labels stating this will NOT be allowed in school.
- If the package does not clearly state "packaged in a facility WITHOUT nuts" the ingredients must be labeled and read to guarantee no nuts/nut products are contained.

While many allergic reactions can be mild, most children with peanut and other nut allergies experience serious symptoms after eating, touching or smelling peanuts or any nut products (especially peanut butter). Please take time to read the labels on any food that you purchase for your child to bring to school.

Breakfast Alternative Daily: Cereal, Milk, Fruit, Juice, Yogurt and Whole Grain Muffin. In the operation of National School Food Programs, no child will be discriminated against because of race, color, national origin, age or disability. If you believe you have been discriminated against, write immediately to the Department of Agriculture. Please note that our menu is subject to change based on availability of food items.

These DEC camps combine environmental education, hunter education programs, and outdoor recreation into a fun adventure. They use a hands-on approach to teach about the environment. Campers will have the opportunity to learn outdoor skills including backpacking, camping, and canoeing. They will explore New York's diverse habitats, have the chance to learn basic ecological concepts, and how human activities affect the environment. Campers solve challenges, explore environmental concepts, practice outdoor skills, and spend the week immersed in nature. The 2022 Camp Season marked 75 years of fostering a love for the natural world.

Campers must be the minimum age by $12 / 1$ in the calendar year to attend camp.
The cost is $\$ 350$ per camper, per week. This price includes all meals and trips during camp. It does not include transportation to and from camp.

The Newcomb Lions Club is offering to sponsor up to 4 Newcomb Central School candidates. Potential candidates can write a letter to the Lions Club outlining their commitment.
