# Five W's and H Framework of State Assessments

A message from Superintendent Chris Fisher

Why do we test each spring? The Office of State Assessment is responsible for the development and implementation of the New York State Testing Program. As part of the testing program, assessments in grades three through eight are administered to evaluate each student's knowledge of the New York State Learning Standards in the content areas of English Language Arts, Mathematics and new this year, eighth grade Science as well. The state assessments are intended to provide districts with valuable information about individual areas of academic strength as well as help to identify areas that a student may need additional academic support with. Administering assessments also help the state determine if school districts are meeting required progress targets per the Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA).

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**What** do districts do with the results from state testing? Information obtained from the tests help districts meet a student exactly where they are at in the learning process and develop specially designed instruction for each student. Results from the state tests help classroom teachers monitor and adjust their instructional practices and implement various strategies and supports to help students along the continuum of learning.

**How** are the tests administered? In 2017, Newcomb Central School district was one of the first schools in the north country to implement Computer Based Testing (CBT). Since its inception, each year students at NCS have taken the tests on the computer and have become familiar with the expectations of computer-based testing. Students have also participated in field and practice testing for the state.

**When** will testing take place this spring? The testing period for English Language Arts this year is April 19th and April 20th. Mathematics will be administered on May 3rd and May 4th. New this year, students in grade eight will also take the Grade 8 Science Performance test on May 31st and the Grade 8 Science Written Test on June 5th.

**Who** should participate? Per the federal requirements under the Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA), 95% of students should participate yearly in required state assessments. The New York State Education Department encourages all students in grades three through eight to participate in the New York State 3-8 Assessments. For the 2022 testing window, Newcomb had a 96.3% participation rate for the English Language Arts Test and a 100% participation rate for the 3-8 Mathematics Test. We would like to strive for a 100% participation rate for all three exams this year, including the new Grade 8 Science test!

**Where** can I get more information about the New York State 3-8 Assessments? Please feel free to reach out to the school to have your questions answered about the upcoming state tests.

How can you help your child prepare for the exams? One way is to encourage them to get the proper amount of sleep needed each night before the tests. Eating a good breakfast on the morning of the tests also helps to ensure that students are ready to give their best effort. Reassuring students that they have worked hard and have the knowledge that they need to perform well on the test may help to reduce test anxiety.

# **Library Office to Become Student Learning Lab**

In an effort to implement a number of academic and social-emotional supports for students, NCS will be establishing a Student Learning Lab in the office space off of the secondary library. This area will be used for the implementation of research-based practices and interventions for students. The Student Learning Lab will be accessible to all students and faculty members in grades pre-kindergarten through twelfth grade. The Student Learning Lab will provide a private, collaborative space for small group meetings, study groups or organized work groups. The space would also lend itself to peer to peer mentoring and the delivery of Academic Intervention Services or related services. Complete with flexible seating, the space will afford students and staff with access to academic materials, technology, educational materials, a professional library, and supplies.

Faculty and staff will have the option of signing out the space for coaching experiences with colleagues, individual meetings with students, or a location to address social emotional learning.

The district has surveyed students, faculty and staff for input on the design process for the space with a projected grand opening in the fall of 2023!

# What is Restorative Justice in Schools?

A message from PJ Motsiff - Director of Curriculum and Instruction



In our small, close knit school community it is important that we pay attention to the people we spend most of our day with for 180 days each year. In order for our school to have a positive culture and climate, maintaining relationships needs to remain a priority.

**Restorative justice** is an alternative to using punishment-based approaches to school discipline and behavior management in K-12 classrooms. It focuses on repairing harm through inclusive processes that bring students and educators together.

Just to be clear, it is a false dichotomy that restorative practices being a part of our established Code of Conduct will result in us "giving hugs instead of consequences." Restorative practices involve taking accountability for harm that is caused as a result of behavior, and working to restore damaged relationships. Engaging students in restorative work is just what the name implies - it is work. It requires reflection, honesty, empathy, and a desire to move forward in a positive direction. It takes time, and it's not easy. However, engaging students in restorative work does not mean that they will not also experience more "traditional" consequences for a behavioral incident. It's not an "either/or" situation. Having a restorative mindset reflects the value we all place on the importance of positive, respectful relationships as well as our understanding that it is through those relationships that we are most able to effect positive change. Will students still need, on occasion, to experience traditional consequences? Of course they will. But when they return to their classrooms we want them to be able to do so with relationships intact, harm repaired, and knowing that they continue to be a valued member of our learning community.

Our students are experiencing a world that is changing at a pace that is way too fast to keep up with. This makes it important to remember that we need to support their social emotional learning if we want to create positive, productive, and respectful relationships with our students. If we don't, their learning suffers.

# From The Health Office

# PLEASE BE MINDFUL WHEN SENDING FOOD TO SCHOOL WITH YOUR STUDENT



The following NCS policies remain in effect:

- All students will NOT be allowed to eat peanuts/nuts (or items containing them) in any school environment or vehicle.
- Homemade baked goods/foods will NOT be allowed in school.
- Please read the food labels on packaged items your own child may bring to school to ensure no peanuts, tree nuts, peanut butter or peanut oil is among the ingredients.
- While reading food labels, please be mindful of any statements that indicate that the food item was produced or processed in a building/on equipment where peanuts or tree nuts are also produced/processed, or statements such as "item may contain trace nuts." Labels stating this will NOT be allowed in school.
- If the package does not clearly state "packaged in a facility WITHOUT nuts" the ingredients must be labeled and read to guarantee no nuts/nut products are contained.

While many allergic reactions can be mild, most children with peanut and other nut allergies experience serious symptoms after eating, touching or smelling peanuts or any nut products (especially peanut butter). Please take time to read the labels on any food that you purchase for your child to bring to school.

- 1. All seniors going off to college will need to fill out the <u>FAFSA</u> (www.fafsa.ed.gov) which began in October this year. You can apply on-line, which saves a lot of time. Before you can do that, you and a parent need to register for a FSA ID. To get your FSA ID you can go to fsaid.ed.gov.
- 2. Make sure you have a copy of everything for your own records, **BEFORE** you mail it out. **Be sure to check** your college deadlines for financial aid forms! YOU NEED TO APPLY FOR FINANCIAL AID EVERY
- 3. If you have not done so already, you need to get your college applications ready to send out. The sooner the better!
- 4. Parents of seniors: Please keep an eye out in the mail for scholarship opportunities. I usually send them out in the winter/spring. I send all scholarship opportunities home to each senior's family. You will need to read the qualifications to see if your child/family qualifies for the scholarships, before your child applies.

# **SPRING- GRADE 11**

- Register for and take the Spring SAT and/or ACT's.
- Visit potential colleges of interest.

#### FALL- GRADE 12

- Gather your list of activities and community involvement. Write a resume.
- Continue visiting and narrowing your possible college choices.
- Contact teachers for letters of recommendation.
- If applying for Early Decision be aware of deadlines, Nov. 1<sup>st</sup> is common (there are also special Early Decision Financial Aid Forms).
- Almost all applications can now be done online. If you choose to do this, notify the guidance office so all supporting documentation can be forwarded.
- Many applications have a secondary school report required. Bring these forms to the guidance office immediately for completion or invite your teachers and counselor electronically.
- Set a goal of December 1<sup>st</sup> to have all applications complete. Do not plan to have an application processed over Christmas Vacation.
- October is Financial Aid month. Start by applying for a Signature PIN number at <a href="http://www.fsaid.ed.gov/">http://www.fsaid.ed.gov/</a>. All aid packages start with the FAFSA form which must be done online at <a href="http://www.fafsa.ed.gov/">http://www.fsaid.ed.gov/</a>. Some colleges have additional forms, institutional, or CSS profiles. Be sure to make yourself aware of what you need.
- Each college has its own Financial Aid deadline. Students are responsible for this information. Always make the financial aid deadline, even if you have to estimate earnings.






