At NCS, we are committed to creating a school environment that is not only academically enriching but also emotionally supportive and inclusive for all students. This school year we have been afforded the opportunity to participate in two college research programs that align with our commitment to fostering a caring and supportive school environment: the Above the Influence (ATI) Peer Leadership Program and the Relationship Mapping Initiative from the Making Caring Common Program.

Empowering Youth to Make Healthy Choices

Through the ATI program, our 8th and 9th graders had the chance to work alongside students from two other Essex County communities to become peer leaders in the fight against vaping. This collaborative initiative provided our students with the knowledge, skills, and confidence to promote positive choices among their peers and discourage vaping behaviors.

The ATI program is rooted in the belief that peer influence plays a significant role in shaping adolescent behavior. By empowering our students to become positive role models and advocates for healthy choices, we are creating a ripple effect of positive influence that extends throughout our school community.

Building Strong Connections for Student Success

Recognizing the importance of strong relationships between students and adults at school, we also participated in the Relationship Mapping Initiative from Harvards's Making Caring Common Program. This initiative involved staff working together to identify students who may not have strong connections with adults at school. The goal of the Relationship Mapping Initiative is to ensure that every student has at least one adult in their school who they can trust, look up to, and turn to for support. By identifying and addressing gaps in student-adult connections, we are fostering a school environment where all students feel valued, supported, and connected.

SENIORS:

All seniors going off to college will need to fill out the <u>FAFSA</u> beginning in <u>December or January</u>. You can apply on-line, which saves a lot of time. Before you can do that, <u>you and a parent</u> need to register for a <u>FSA ID</u>. To get your FSA ID you can go to <u>www.fsaid.ed.gov</u>. If your parents or siblings have a PIN, they can "link" their PIN number to their FSA ID. This will aid in transferring your information from PIN to your FSA ID. When you receive your FSA ID number go to <u>www.fafsa.ed.gov</u> to apply for Financial Aid. Financial Aid forms can be filled out beginning in October this year, using last year's tax returns. You should do this right away. Doing them on-line is much faster and easier.

VISIT the colleges you plan to apply to! You are going to want to be at a place that you like. You won't know that unless you take a tour. This year you may have to take your tour virtually, but it is still important to see the campus you plan to live in.

I need your updated transcripts or resumes so that I can send the colleges accurate information. Please list all activities you have done grades 9-12, so that I don't forget anything. Please include any volunteer work you have done. Remember, volunteering means you are not receiving money for the work you are doing. Example: class fundraising is not volunteer work, you are receiving money for a senior trip for all class fundraising activities.





Newcomb will be celebrating the Hour of Code throughout the week in library and STEAM classes. "The Hour of Code is a global movement introducing tens of millions of students worldwide to computer science, inspiring kids to learn more, breaking stereotypes, and leaving them feeling empowered" (hourofcode.com). There are currently hundreds of coding activities for grades Kindergarten and up in 48 languages. The goal is to help students practice coding and build creativity with challenges and a sense of accomplishment. With the ever-expanding presence of technology like AI, and careers in the field of computer science changing, and our increased use of social media, it is important that we teach our kids to be ethical creators and competent consumers.



Caught in the Northeast!

The Northeast Regional Instrumental Music Festival took place in Lake George on November 16th-19th. It is a wonderful music performance event originated in 1969 at the University of Vermont by Dr. Herbert Schultz. The festival draws talented high school musicians to come together for a four day music camp. Before admission to the festival, students are auditioned on their ability to play only brief segments of the music which will be learned throughout their time at the Northeast. The entire 5 music titles are given to students once the audition process is complete. The next four days of rehearsals are spent transforming the dry black and white markings on music manuscript paper into something absolutely beautiful, a well prepared, balanced, colorful and highly expressive instrumental work of art- music!
