### **Reduced Funding for NY School Districts**

A message from Superintendent Fisher

Governor Hochul's executive budget proposes changes to school aid. While the total aid is increasing by \$500 million, a change in the Foundation Aid formula proposes to cut assistance by \$420 million which could negatively impact many rural school districts. Proposed cuts to the Foundation Aid may leave some schools at risk of staff layoffs and potential program reductions due to declining enrollment. The hardest-hit areas include parts of the North Country, along with the Capital Region outskirts, mid-Hudson Valley, Southern Tier rural areas, lower Hudson Valley, eastern Long Island, and some parts of New York City. What does reduced funding for New York schools mean for Newcomb? While we are still developing the budget for the 2024-2025 school year, our goal is to uphold the district's mission of offering a safe and enriching international environment while encouraging student directed learning and empowering students through technology to become global citizens so that they can better their world. Our intentions are to maintain our existing robust instructional programming while continuing to prepare a fiscally responsible budget.

There are numerous unfunded mandates as well as reporting requirements that districts must adhere to alongside ever increasing demands by the New York State Education Department. Amidst increasing mandates and changes, small schools such as Newcomb find themselves implementing creative solutions such as wearing multiple hats to get the jobs done. Did you know that the New York State Education Department mandates that instruction be provided by certified teachers in each subject area, and for every grade level and it is considered outside of compliance if teachers teach more than one course outside of their certification area? Thankfully, NCS is fortunate to have a number of educators who hold multiple certifications. This maximizes flexibility when covering required courses for graduation. By way of example, our Library Media Specialist also provides STEAM instruction for all students in grades Pre-k-12, our Technology Teacher also teaches a math class and a majority of our secondary educators are adjunct faculty professors teaching college level courses while also teaching required courses for high school graduation. Elementary grades are doubled up with classroom teachers delivering two different grade level curriculums to students simultaneously. It's an impressive dance to witness the planning, preparation and execution of daily instruction in our school!

What happens when teachers are out sick? The New York State Education Department imposes that districts provide certified substitutes. The district works hard to meet this requirement but on days when we are unable to secure certified or uncertified substitutes, it is not uncommon to see teachers and staff members assuming multiple duties and responsibilities by donating a planning period or a lunch period to cover classes.

Small schools have the same reporting requirements as large districts yet they do not always have the same hierarchy of personnel to complete necessary tasks. How does Newcomb work to adhere to increasing state and federal mandates with fewer staff? In a number of areas across our school operations staff members assume multiple positions. This can be seen in the role of the Superintendent/Principal, Head Custodian/Access Security Officer, Kitchen Manager/Substitute Bus Driver, Driver/Cleaner and District Treasurer/Payroll Supervisor, Director of Curriculum and Instruction/International Coordinator to name a few. The same philosophy applies with absences which is why you may see the Superintendent at the register in the cafeteria or covering arrival and dismissal at the back door, the Transportation Supervisor might cover by conducting a building check or the Director of Curriculum and Instruction could be taking over a class so that a teacher can participate in professional development. NCS truly is a special place where everyone steps up to support one another to get the job done.



The Office of State Assessment oversees the creation and execution of the New York State Testing Program. This program includes tests given to students in grades three to eight, assessing their understanding of New York State Learning Standards in English Language Arts, Mathematics, and now Science. The main purpose of these assessments is to offer districts insight into students' academic strengths and pinpoint areas where they may require extra support. By conducting

these tests, the state can also gauge whether school districts are achieving the progress goals mandated by the Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA).

How does state testing results help students and teachers at NCS? Districts utilize the outcomes of state assessments to tailor instruction to individual students, pinpointing their current learning level and craft personalized teaching methods. Results from these tests help our classroom teachers in monitoring and adjusting their teaching approaches, as well as gauging how to and implement diverse strategies to further support our students.



According to the federal requirements under the Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA) 95% of students should participate yearly in required state assessments. The New York State Education Department encourages all students in grades three through eight to participate in the New York State 3-8 Assessments. For the 2023 testing window, Newcomb had a 100% participation rate for the English Language Arts Test and a 100% participation rate for the 3-8 Mathematics Test and 100% participation rate for the Science test. Help us to strive for a 100% participation rate for all three exams again this year!

### **Helping Your Child Prepare for State Exams**



One strategy to assist your child in exam preparation is to promote consistent, restful sleep the evening before the exams. Another helpful tip is to ensure your child eats a nourishing breakfast on the day of the tests, preparing them to perform at their optimal level. Additionally, providing reassurance to your child regarding their efforts and preparedness could alleviate any test-related stress they may experience.

The NYS Grades 3-8 standardized tests will be administered in April and May. We understand these tests can create significant pressure for students, potentially impacting their self-confidence, motivation, and overall well-being. As educators, it is our responsibility to create a supportive environment that acknowledges these challenges and equips our students with strategies to manage their emotions effectively. We are working hard to help our students feel prepared both academically and emotionally. While strong instruction aligned to the standards is crucial, we must also address the social-emotional needs of our students during this period of heightened stress and anxiety.

The 2024 testing windows at Newcomb are as follows:

NYS ELA: Grades 3-8, April 16-18<sup>th</sup>

NYS Math: Grades 3-8, April 30<sup>th</sup>-May 2<sup>nd</sup> NYS Science: Grade 8, May 7<sup>th</sup>; Grade 5, May 14<sup>th</sup>

Here are some SEL-focused tips to help your child prepare for the upcoming tests:

- 1. Normalize Feelings of Anxiety Feeling some level of anxiety or nerves before a big test is normal.
- 2. Teach Stress Management Techniques Practice relaxation strategies such as breathing exercises or mindfulness practices.
- 3. Promote a Growth Mindset Tests are an opportunity to demonstrate their learning progress!
- 4. Encourage Self-Care Ensure your child gets sufficient sleep, nutrition, and opportunities for physical activity.

By integrating social-emotional support into our test preparation efforts, together we can create an environment that nurtures the whole child. Our students will not only feel more equipped to tackle the academic challenges, but also develop critical life skills in managing stress and building resilience.

Remember, standardized tests are only a snapshot in time, and our unwavering belief in each student's talents and potential is what truly matters.

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that the Budget Hearing of the inhabitants of the Newcomb Central School District, Newcomb New York, qualified to vote at school meetings in said district, will be held at the schoolhouse in said district on Thursday, May 9, 2024, at 6:00 p.m. for the transaction of such business as is authorized by the Education Law.

**NOTICE IS ALSO GIVEN** that a copy of the statement of the amount of money which will be required for the ensuing year for school purposes, exclusive of public monies, may be obtained by any taxpayer in the district during the seven days immediately preceding the Budget Hearing, except Saturday, Sunday, or holidays at the school during reasonable hours. A report of tax exemptions, showing how much of the total assessed value on the final assessment roll or rolls used in that budgetary process is exempt from taxation, shall be annexed to the budget document.

An application for an early mail ballot must be received by the District Clerk at least seven (7) days before the election if the ballot is to be mailed to the voter, or the day before the election if the ballot is to be delivered personally to the voter. A list of all persons to whom early mail ballots shall have been issued will be available in said Office of the Clerk on each of the five days prior to the day of elections, except Saturday, Sunday or holidays, and that such list will also be posted at the polling place on the day of the Annual Election and Budget Vote.

A list of persons to whom absentee ballots have been issued will be available for inspection in the district office during each of the five days prior to the day of the election except Saturday, Sunday, or holidays, and this list also will be posted at the polling place on the day of the election/budget vote.

An absentee ballot must reach the office of the district clerk/designee not later than 3:00 p.m. on the day of the election.

- C. Resident of the district for 30 days or more prior to the vote

### **SPRING -11<sup>th</sup> GRADE**

- Register for and take the Spring SAT and/or ACT's.
- Visit potential colleges of interest.

### FALL-12<sup>th</sup> GRADE

- Gather your list of activities and community involvement. Write a resume.
- Continue visiting and narrowing your possible college choices.
- Contact teachers for letters of recommendation.
- If applying Early Decision be aware of deadlines, Nov. 1<sup>st</sup> is common (There are also special Early Decision Financial Aid Forms).
- Most applications can now be done online. If you choose to do this, notify the school counselor so all supporting documentation can be forwarded.
- Many applications have a secondary school report required. Please let me know you
  have applied so that I can complete these secondary reports or invite your teachers and
  counselor electronically.
- Set a goal of December 1st to have all applications complete. Do not plan to have an application processed over Christmas vacation.
- October is Financial Aid month. Start by applying for a Signature PIN number at <a href="http://www.fsaid.ed.gov/">http://www.fsaid.ed.gov/</a>. All aid packages start with the FAFSA form which must be done online at <a href="http://www.fafsa.ed.gov/">http://www.fafsa.ed.gov/</a>. Some colleges have additional forms, institutional or CSS profiles. Be sure to make yourself aware of what you need.
- Each college has its own Financial Aid deadline. Students are responsible for this information. Always make the financial aid deadline, even if you have to estimate earnings.



### It's a Pi Day Celebration!


Every March 14th (3.14), math aficionados celebrate Pi Day. It is a chance for math and science enthusiasts to honor the amazing irrational number known as Pi. Once again, Newcomb secondary students were invited to join Indian Lake and Long Lake in a Pi Day Trivia contest. This year teams of six answered five rounds of math related trivia questions. Each round was worth a maximum of 1500 points. In all, thirty Newcomb students in grades seven through twelve attended, making up five teams of mixed ages.

To help prepare for the big day, students worked in groups to create Pi Day posters. Posters needed to include one item from each of the following categories: a formula that uses Pi, a Pi joke, a cartoon featuring Pi, a movie/tv show that refers to Pi, a famous person that has something to do with Pi, a random fact, a quote dealing with Pi, a fact about Archimedes, and a famous woman in math or science. The Newcomb, Indian Lake and Long Lake math teachers then used the students' posters to create the trivia questions.

Once again, the stakes were high. Newcomb students were playing for the right to pie Mr. Leerkes in the face and defend their Pi Day championship title from 2023. After the final question was answered, a Newcomb team finished in first place. As a matter of fact, Newcomb's five teams all finished in the top seven spots out of seventeen teams! The winning team consisted of Lilian Monroe, Jacob Richards, Katlin Fifield, Marissa Fifield, Emma Adams, and team captain Adrian Gonzalez.

In addition to our trivia champions, the glory of pieing Mr. Leerkes was also awarded to the students who were judged to have made the best Pi Day poster. That honor went to Ember Monroe, Kendall Boisvert and Jayden Dick from the Algebra 1 class.

Ms. Armstrong also got her elementary students into the Pi Day fun. Her student, Laurelai Gaboriault, also got to pie Mr. Leerkes in the face for reciting the most digits of Pi!

We ended the regular season with 13 wins and 7 losses. We did manage to split the regular season matchup with Boquet Valley and win the rest of our divisional games which allowed us to be co-champs of Division 1.

We had some very entertaining games in the regular season but the fun really began in the post season. We were seeded number 4 in the sectionals. That gave us a matchup with the 5 seed which was Keene. We had a tough game with Keene in the regular season which we won but we knew it would be a close game. We got by Keene which was the last home game that we would play. Next up was at Boquet Valley, who was the top seed. We played a great game and were able to beat them on their own court. The highlight to the game was Logan Bush surpassing 1,000 points for his varsity career. The team then faced the 2<sup>nd</sup> seeded team which was Crown Point. That game was played at Clinton Community College. The hard fought double overtime win resulted in a Section 7 Championship for the Wild Huskies which led us to the Regional Finals against the top seeded team in Section 2 to be North Warren. We returned to Clinton Community College for that game and unfortunately, lost that game by one point. North Warren went on to win the next two games to become state champions.

I can't explain how proud I am to have been a part of this team. Our Newcomb players represented our school in the most respectable way. Basketball is a long season and these boys did a lot of travelling to compete on this team. To their credit, I never heard one complaint.

Camden Lamphear came up to the varsity team at the conclusion of the JV season where he was his team's 2<sup>nd</sup> leading scorer. He did not get a lot of playing time in games at the varsity level. He did however, work very hard in practice and I'm convinced he made the varsity better with his efforts. He will be a player to watch in the future.

Marcus Armstrong made his mark for the team. I told him a couple of times throughout the season that the painted area on the court was posted property and he was the land owner. I think he took that to heart because he sure did make it tough for the opposing teams. Whether he was playing defense, rebounding, setting screens, or scoring, the other team always knew where he was. He really put his stamp on the Sectional Championship game where he had a bucket to tie the game in the overtime as well as a couple of crucial rebounds.

Logan Bush was incredible this year. He was the point guard for this team which meant he possessed the ball more than 80% of every game. A true floor general in every sense, he led the team in almost every statistical aspect of most games. As mentioned earlier, he surpassed the 1,000 point mark. He did that with only playing 3 varsity seasons because of COVID. He was named to the MVAC Division 1 All Star 1<sup>st</sup> team as well as the MVP in the Section 7 Championship Game. He did all that while being responsible of guarding the opposing team's best player on a nightly basis. In every case, he gave up inches in height. Most of those players towered over him but he still managed to keep them well below their scoring average.

It has been an absolute pleasure watching both Logan and Marcus play this year and they will leave a gaping hole in the Newcomb sports program.



Join staff at the Adirondack Interpretive Center (AIC) for children's activities from 10 am to 4 pm. At 1 pm, the PBS documentary film "Eclipse Across America", about the 2017 total solar eclipse will be shown.



### **Sunday April 7th**

These activities will continue at the AIC on Sunday as well. At 1 pm, Professor Luke Keller, from Ithaca College, will present on the eclipse, "A Day Without Night and a Night Without Day". At 3 pm the film about the 2017 total solar eclipse will be shown again.

Everyone is invited to the Newcomb Fire Hall for a Lights Out Chili Cook-Off from 5-8 pm. You have two ways to participate - make some chili for tasting or just be a taster. ### **Monday April 8th**

The main event happens Monday afternoon. The moon will start to eclipse the sun at 2:14 pm. Its shadow will totally cover the sun for nearly 3 minutes beginning at 3:25 pm.

Community and guests plan to gather behind the Information Center beginning at 1:30 pm. There will be music, children's activities and food. If you want to attend but do not have a way to get there, let Dave Hughes, at the info center, know and we will arrange for the town van to pick you up! Do not miss this spectacular occurrence!

Parents and caregivers, always supervise children to make sure they use their eclipse glasses safely.

### **Eclipse Safety**



Make sure you read this section with a grown up so you stay safe during an eclipse!

It's super important to keep your eyes safe during a solar eclipse. The only time it's ok to look at the Sun without special glasses is during the few minutes of time when the Moon completely covers the Sun. This short time period when the Moon's disk completely covers the Sun is called totality.

Using regular sunglasses or looking through binoculars, a camera lens, or a telescope without special filters can hurt your eyes badly. Even if you're wearing **eclipse glasses**, NEVER look at the Sun through a camera or telescope – it's dangerous! Also, don't point your phone camera at the partial phases of an eclipse, it is too bright and will damage or ruin your camera, just like it could your eyes. It is ok to take a photo during totality, but you may want to spend that short time looking with your eyes.

To safely watch the eclipse, you need special "eclipse glasses." These glasses are not like regular sunglasses, no matter how dark or fancy they are. Eclipse glasses are much darker and follow safety rules called ISO 12312-2.

Before you use your eclipse glasses, check if they have any rips, scratches, or damage. If they do, don't use them – throw them away. If you don't have eclipse glasses, you can still watch the eclipse without looking directly at the Sun. You can make a **pinhole projector**, which is a cool way to see the Sun's image projected onto a surface. But remember, don't peek at the Sun through the pinhole!

Remember these important points:

- Only use special eclipse glasses to look at the Sun, except during totality.
- Take off your eclipse glasses only during totality to enjoy the full eclipse.
- Put your eclipse glasses back on as soon as you see any part of the Sun after totality.
- Eclipse glasses are not safe for use with cameras, binoculars, or telescopes.
   Special filters are needed for these devices.
- If you can't find eclipse glasses, use a pinhole projector to watch the eclipse safely.
